Dear All, One of the great things about our church is that it is open. It's open every day, throughout the day, so that sinners, saints, and shoppers alike can call in and spend some time with the Lord. And they do. Many people come and pray, placing their petitions before God in this house of prayer. As the entrance antiphon puts it: "To you I call; for you will surely heed me, O God." During the next couple of weeks, St Luke will be teaching us about prayer. This week, the parable is a lesson in persistence in prayer. While the parable seems to present prayer as nagging God for what we want, such a reading misses the point. God is not like the judge. The key is found in the description of the judge as corrupt and unjust. Since God can be neither, we must understand Jesus to be saying that if even an unjust judge responds to the persistence of the widow, how much more so will God listen to our prayers. God truly wants to hear our needs and respond generously. Jesus gets to the heart of the parable when he teaches us about the persistence of the one who prays. God wants us to be like the persistent widow, staying in relationship with God, confident that God hears and answers prayers. Then Jesus laments, "Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?" In this lament, Jesus notes how easy it can be for us to lose heart. But this doesn't need to be the case. In this month dedicated to the Holy Rosary, we ask Our Lady to support us and to pray with us and our families, especially in the difficult moments of life. **Fr John**

LECTIO DIVINA

Reading the Scripture Reflecting on the Meaning Responding through Prayer Resting in God Responding in Action

Lectio Divina is a particular way of reading the Bible. It calls for a different approach from the rapid reading that we're all accustomed to. In Lectio we read the text slowly and meditatively. Lectio Divina is reading in the power of the Holv Spirit, who frees, heals and gives us life. The Holy Spirit lifts us above the literal meaning of the text to listen to the voice of God, which deifies men and women by uniting them with Christ, Lectio Divina brings about a conversation from our empty minds obsessed by flesh and blood to the mind of Christ, so that we can receive the ears, eyes and heart of Christ. Lectio Divina is ancient. It is, in fact, the way in which the Fathers of the Church read the Scriptures in the first centuries. Lectio can be practised individually or in groups.

How to get started?

Find a quiet place and light a candle. This will help you to remember that Christ is the Light of the World and recalls the candle that burnt at your baptism. A crucifix or cross will show you how greatly God loves you. An icon or image of Our Lady or one of the saints reminds you that you never do Lectio Divina alone.

Choose a reading- my suggestion is the gospel reading for next Sunday.

Remember that Lectio is praying the scriptures, so start by saying a prayer of the Holy Spirit, followed by a brief examination of conscience, asking the Lord for forgiveness and mercy, as you open your heart to receive his Word.

Read the passage slowly. Read it a second time but pause after each verse to allow the Word of God to touch your heart. Don't rush to move on to the next verse but treasure the silence; in silence you will discover space to listen. You will often find that a particular verse resonates, spend time praying this verse, repeat it and allow the Word of God to touch your heart. At the end of the session, say the Lord's Prayer and pray for somebody or a particular intention.

In his book, From a Prophetic Voice in the City - Meditations on the Prophet Jeremiah - Cardinal Carlo Maria Martini writes, 'The word of God contained in the Bible, before being an activity, is truly a gift of God. Through this word, God gives himself to me, speaks to me nourishes me with his life, communicates his love, power, and divinity just as he communicates it to me in the Eucharist.' **Fr James**
